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# UNION OF NETHERLANDS MUNICIPALITIES (VNG): REACTION TO GOVERNMENT BED-BATH-BREAD PROPOSAL

On April 22, the government <u>decided</u> that only five municipalities are allowed to provide shelter, just for a few weeks, and in view of return. People should apply by way of the DT&V. If other municipalities were to provide shelter, they would be penalized.

By means of this <u>letter</u>, he Union of Dutch Municipalities (VNG) is reacting to the government proposal. The VNG prefers for several municipalities to provide shelter, for a longer duration, and states they should not be penalized for results they have no influence on: return or a status being granted.

During the parliamentary debate on the government proposal members of parliament kept referring to a consultation by the secretary of state with the VNG. During that consultation, other arrangements must be made. A date for this consultation has not yet been set.

# 1. BASIC RIGHTS

Care Institute: nationalities of patients whose medication is paid for

The Care Institute funds medication of patients without residence permits who cannot pay for themselves. Thus, the use of medication gives an insight into the group of care recipients without residence permits. At the request of LOS Foundation, the Care Institute has made a survey of the topten of medication users:

What strikes us is that people without residence permits who have no asylum background apply for most of the compensation for medication costs.

# 2. ADMISSION POLICY

Council of State: asylum seeker must change Facebook page to avoid risks upon return

This case concerns an Iranian woman who applied for asylum because she had been converted to
Christianity. The Immigration and Naturalisation Service (IND) did not believe her. She had posted
Christian texts on Facebook, which might constitute a risk upon her return. The Council of State rules
that she herself must change her Facebook page in order to return safely. Read further information

Council of State: admission mother to Dutch child, Dutch father abusive und unfit to provide care According to EU law, a parent without a residence permit receives right of residence with a child who has the nationality of the land of residence, if the other parent cannot care for the child. The IND rejects many applications for residence, since it holds that the other parent is capable of providing care. In this case, the child suffered from domestic violence. The Council of State rules that an abusive Dutch parent must not be burdened with the care of a Dutch child. Read further information <a href="here">here</a> (in Dutch only).

Council of State: no right of residence for old Egyptian who has lived in the Netherlands for 30 years. The application for an asylum permit for this Egyptian has been rejected. He has lived in the Netherlands for 30 years and should have applied for asylum earlier. In view of his private life he is not entitled to a residence permit either, as he did not have a residence permit for the duration of those 30 years. #### State Secretary Security & Justice: number of no-fault residence permits

As a result of the debate about shelter for people with no residence permits, questions have been asked about the number of no-fault residence permits. In 2013, 15 persons were granted a no-fault residence permit, and in 2014 the number amounted to 20. In earlier years, far higher numbers were involved.
